

The school offers several summer projects and the one that motivated me the most was *Misiones*. *Misiones* 2013 was in Osorno, in a little city called Quillacahuín, and the goal was to spend time with the poor and the isolated. On January 2nd we were preparing for everything that would happen that evening. We went with a group of students, ChACErs, teachers, and priests.

The trip was long. We arrived in Quillacahuín and the people there were awaiting our arrival and were very kind to us. We spent 10 days there. Every day we woke up early, had breakfast and started walking between trees and mountains. We walked and walked long distances and did not see any houses. There was nothing. They don't have lights, supermarkets, or hospitals. Everything is in Osorno and most of the families don't have transportation to get there. When we found a house they received us kindly and offered us something to drink and eat. In the house we talked with the family and they spoke about their lives. Most of the days were very similar, but every day we learned something new.

If I would have to rate this experience, I would have to say that it was one of the most incredible experiences that I have ever had. The humility of the people there is gorgeous. They are away from everything, but it is not a difficulty for them, they are happy with what they have. During the year

they don't see anyone apart from their family, so they wait for us to come visit them. Whether it was praying with them, playing with children, or visiting the sick, we were sharing our Catholic faith with them. After the *Misiones* I learned a new concept of life. This summer the *Misiones* will go to Chiloé and they are hoping for the same support and enthusiasm from St. George's students. "Our service goal is the gift of ourselves in accompaniment. We want to visit an impoverished area and to listen to their stories and experiences, which are truly stories that need to be told," José Ignacio Figueroa, a pastoral supervisor, said about the upcoming trips. We are very proud of all the Georgians who have given their time and talents to *Misiones*, and hope that the trips in January continue to be as successful.

Chuck Palahniuk is the American writer of the moment. Having just released the second part of one of his most popular novels, "Damned," "Doomed" keeps this special signature writing that has made Palahniuk so famous. It was in 1996 when he managed to publish, the cult novel "Fight Club" but it wasn't until David Fisher adapted the book into the popular movie of the same name in 1999, that Palahniuk started to get famous.

His unique style of satirical and transgressive novel has made him one of the most famous writers of this time. The story of the little or shy person trying to fit in has proven to be an effective topic, relating to almost everyone and each time with a different kind of focus, the short sentences and the language manage to set us inside the character's mind. 












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
